Progress - New River Trail Construction

In the months of April, May, and June, the Cumberland Trail Conference (CTC) hosted a 10-day trail construction event during each month. The purpose of these events was to continue the trail construction effort to complete the Cumberland Trail's New River segment. This segment is located in the North Cumberland Wildlife Management Area of Scott and Campbell counties with Frozen Head State Park being the segment's southern terminus and Cove Lake State Park being the northern terminus. More specifically, the trail construction effort focused on completing the trail from the confluence of Cave Branch and Smoky Creek south to the ridgeline of Arch Mountain at Grassy Gap. The trail route mainly follows Straight Fork Creek upstream to the ridge. The

CTC was awarded a Recreational Trails Program grant to complete the New River segment. By contract, this segment must be completed by August of 2012.

Because of the remote location of the segment, all three events were primitive camping outings. The CTC established a static base camp and trail workers were shuttled each morning from the camp to within a short walking distance of the trail worksite. At the base camp, the CTC provided meals prepared in the kitchen tent and had potable water Participants were available. asked to bring their own personal camping gear. Hand tools were provided by the CTC and Tennessee State Parks made a Ditch Witch skid loader available for the May and June events. This piece of equipment is a small, walk behind bulldozer.

The spring 2011-trail construction events were a huge success. CTC personnel and volunteers contributed 3,740 trail construction hours for the three events and built 2.23 miles of trail. These miles were predominately constructed by hand due to the very steep terrain in which the skid loader did not function efficiently. However, at locations the equipment could be utilized, it was a big help. The steep terrain required numerous

switchbacks, rock steps, and rock cribbing walls to be constructed.

To date, 29.8 miles of continuous trail exists heading south from the Cove Lake State Park, CT's trailhead. This leaves approximately 5 miles of proposed trail to be constructed to reach the segment's southern terminus at Frozen Head State Park. Trail construction events are scheduled for the fall of 2011 and plans are to complete trail construction by the end of this year.



Oak Ridge's Susan Donnelly wins Nevada race

Championship events held last week in Nevada and California gave athletes from the Knoxville area the opportunity to prove why this region is regarded as among the best in the nation for the sport of running. Susan Donnelly, a resident of Oak Ridge who has completed 139 ultramarathons, won the national masters championship at the Tahoe Rim Trail 100 Mile Endurance Run in Lake Tahoe, Nev. The event also featured a 50K and 50-mile run.

Donnelly traversed the double-loop course in 30 hours, 59 minutes, 5 seconds to win the female masters division in the Road Runners Club of America 2011 National Ultra Championship.

Her time was almost two hours faster than runner-up Emily Brackelsburg, who finished in 32:55:05. Complete results posted at www.trtlive.com.

Describing the course as "very smooth, sandy, dusty, and wide for the most part", Donnelly did have some difficulty with the altitude.

"I've never had problems with altitude, but had some here," said Donnelly. "I'm still not sure exactly why I had problems hill climbing, which I love to push, but I dealt with it and went on."

Joining Donnelly in the multi-distance event was Julia Connor, Liza Graves, Susan Musser, Tracy Rafferty, and Rob Apple.

"The idea of running Lake Tahoe came about from a conversation between Rafferty and Donnelly," said Musser.


"The views of Lake Tahoe and the snow-topped Sierras had to be the most jaw-dropping feature on the course," she added. "I would be remiss if I didn't mention the elevation. We got up to a little over 9,000 feet. The coolest conditions had to be the snow. There were some slippery climbs and descents scattered throughout 8 miles or so, but it was really neat to be surrounded by snow while wearing shorts and a T-shirt." . . .
